



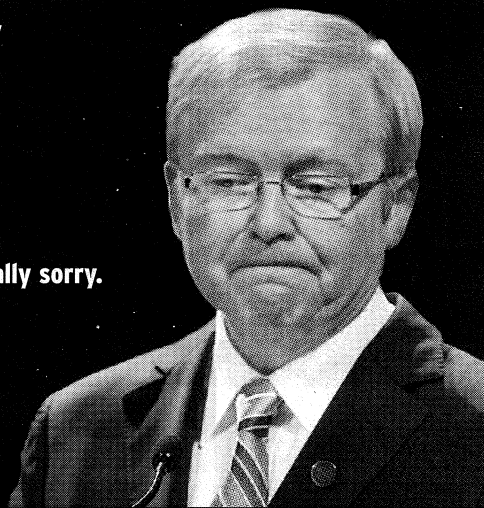

Body language expert Michael Kelly analyses Kevin Rudd's performance in London yesterday as he talked about his mid-air rage

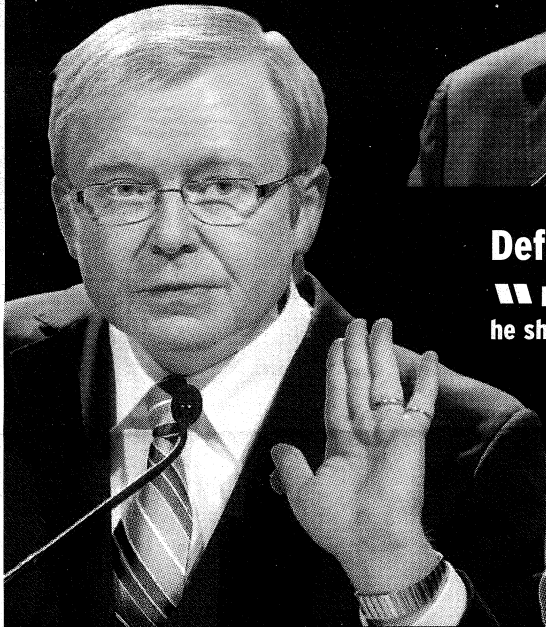
### Insincere

/// The 'I'm really sorry' was a Clayton's apology. He wasn't really sorry.



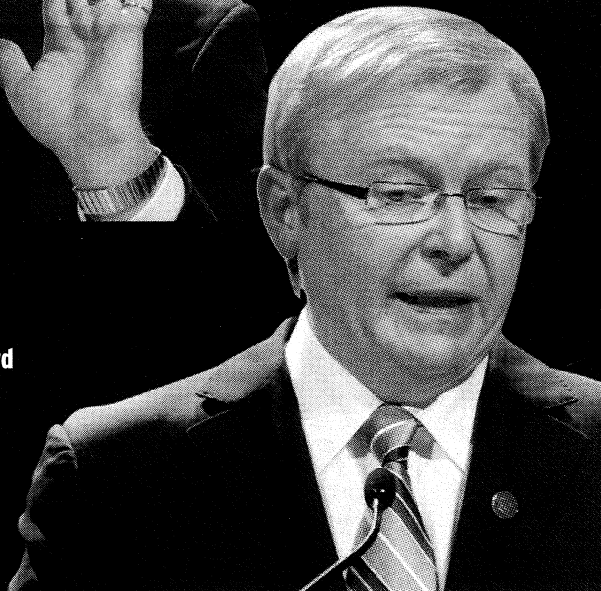
### Defensiveness

HIS lips said sorry but the rest of him did not.

That's body language expert Michael Kelly's verdict on Kevin Rudd's G20 attempt to explain his epicurean air rage incident.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, Mr Kelly said the PM had seemed defensive and irritated when questioned about his abuse of a RAAF stewardess who failed to deliver his desired meal.

Mr Kelly said Mr Rudd's apology seemed

insincere. "The 'I'm really sorry' was a Clayton's apology. He wasn't really sorry."

Mr Kelly said Mr Rudd was like a "tightly corked bottle" and his exterior calm belied a hidden furnace of emotion. "There's a lot going on with Kevin Rudd," he said.
